Questions

- 1. Read 1 Corinthians 7:25-31. We are not sure what "the present crisis" was, but it could be connected to the growing persecution under the Emperor Nero. In unsettled times, marriage and parenthood may sometimes be put on hold. What is the principle for us today (v. 29-31)?
- 2. How can live with a sense of detachment from the world yet be involved in it?
- 3. Read 32-40 (see also v. 8-9). What do you learn about marriage and singleness here? Notice that neither lifestyle choice is wrong (v. 38) yet today marriage or at least having a life partner is seen as essential. What encouragement for single people do you see here?
- 4. How can we be content in our current situation (v. 17)?
- 5. What is an action point for you from this passage?

Sharing from Cambodia... Life in Pusat prison was very tough. As in many prisons, its inmates suffered from overcrowding, poor conditions and a lack of food. Early on, Sinat began experiencing fainting spells both through hunger and through fear of the prison guards.

The only bright spot in Sinat's week was the weekly visits from members of the Bible Society in Cambodia's team. They gave Sinat a Bible. She began to read it. Gradually, she began to understand that through Jesus Christ her sins had been forgiven. She committed her life to Him.

One day, Sinat was unexpectedly taken to court and handed a release paper. She had been set free! Since that time she has committed her life to sharing God's Word with prisoners. And she is hard at work helping her local church plant churches in its area.
